**COMMENTS:** Perchloroethylene (PCE) leak inspections are conducted weekly using a halogenated hydrocarbon detector. A leak detection inspection was conducted while on site and the instrument was operated according to manufacturer's instructions. The PCE leak detector is capable of detecting PCE concentrations of 25 ppm or lower. Inspection records, PCE purchase receipts, and spare parts receipts were up to date. PCE receipts for the 60 gallons of PCE purchased in 2008 matched those recorded on the calendar. The door gasket had been replaced with one purchased some years prior.

Records for the PCE machine were up to date and well maintained. The refrigerated condenser outlet temperature is monitored weekly to determine the temperature is equal to or less than 45 degrees F.

The Compliance Statement Report for this facility has been received by the Department.
