<b>COMMENTS:</b> The inspector met with Mr. Khatri, who showed the calendars for 2012 and 2013, where he keeps record of the consecutive twelve-month totals, along with the purchase receipts. The consecutive twelve-month total for June 2013 is 60 gallons. He also keeps a log with the weekly and monthly inspections on the system components and temperatures, including maintenance and repairs. The machine was not running at the time of inspection, the inspector was not able to check the temperature. Mr. Khatri							

The inspector observed three containers under a plywood cover; one large container properly closed and two smaller containing cartridges, with the covers on, but not tightly sealed. The inspector advised Mr. Khatri to close properly the containers, the metal rings to tighten them, were on the side. Labels were on.

The facility appeared to be in compliance at the time of inspection. No objectionable odors were noted.
